## Instructions for Consent of Proposed Guardian, Nomination of Guardian, Consent to Appointment of Guardian and Waiver of Notice GC-211

- All persons entitled to notice can consent to the guardianship and waive notice. If a person signs, they are waiving their right to notice of the hearings, and you do not have to serve that person.
- The first section (Consent of Proposed Guardian) is for the guardians to sign.
- The second section (Nomination of Guardian) at #3 is where a <u>parent</u> can sign and state who they are nominating as guardian.
- #2 does not apply to guardianships of the person.
- <u>The last section (Consent to Appointment of Guardian and Waiver of Notice) is where all of the</u> relatives who consent – including parents, grandparents, siblings, etc. – can date, print, and sign.
- Even if a parent nominated you in the second section, if they don't sign the last section, they did not waive notice and you still have to serve them.
- Remember that the children themselves, if they are age 12 or older, can sign this form also, or need to be served. This includes the child in the guardianship and any siblings if they agree.
- Photocopy this form for as many signatures as you can gather.
- Sometimes even though someone might agree, it might be easier just to have them served. It is up to you if you wish to use this form.
- File the form(s) before your hearing date.
